When Birth Parents Are Not an Option...

Chailyn was born to a drug addicted mother who already had two children removed from her care, so staying with her mom was not possible. However, thanks to the efforts of CV adoption social worker Vanessa Palma and adoptive parents Carlos and Carmen Diaz, within three months Chailyn had a new family who loved her very much.

Chailyn is one of 20 children—babies to teens—whom Palma and her fellow adoption social worker placed with families last year. In fact, in the past two years, The Children's Village has found adoptive homes for 93% of the children freed for adoption in our family foster care program.

“Much of my job is to find people who have connections to the family, and often we find relatives or even acquaintances who are willing to take the children,” says Palma. “This city is busy and bustling in many ways, but also tightly knit and community minded. It's another way that New York is unique.”

That is exactly what happened with the Diaz's. Carlos Diaz is a security guard in the mother's apartment building, so he knew her situation and that she would be unable to keep her child. Since their children were grown, the Diaz's were willing to provide a loving home for Chailyn.

The Diaz family was so pleased with their experience that they nominated Palma for the AdoptUSKids Case Worker of the Month. “She has love for her kids,” Diaz said. “She makes it her business to get these kids adopted or to have a good home. This is the kind of person she is. She helped us, and she's still there for us.”

CV Wins Innovative Practices Award



The Children's Village was selected by The Council on Accreditation as a recipient of its 2011 Innovative Practices Award for CV's Permanency for Teens initiative.

The goal of Permanency for Teens is to find families for older youth who are aging out of foster care. These are teens who have given up on finding a family and who otherwise would be leaving residential care with no connections. “That is a recipe for failure,” said President and CEO Jeremy Kohomban. “Everyone needs to belong to someone.”

Since its inception in 2004, the program has worked with 97 youth from our residential school with a success rate of 50 percent. Specifically, forty-eight troubled older youth were successfully matched with families and continue to live with or have a strong connection with those families. Many of these youth are now attending college or working in the community.

The COA Innovative Practices Award was created to acknowledge accredited organizations that implement new and forward thinking practices that enhance the quality of services provided to vulnerable children, youth, adults, and families.

CV President Receives National Leadership Award



The Milwaukee-based Alliance for Children and Families presented its 2011 Samuel Gerson Nordlinger Child Welfare Leadership Award to The Children's Village President and CEO Jeremy Kohomban on April 7 at a national child welfare conference in Seattle.

"During his seven years at The Children's Village, Kohomban can be credited with sound fiscal management, superior programming, and instituting long-term strategic planning," the Alliance said in a statement announcing the award. "But these sound practices only scratch the surface of the impact he has made on The Children's Village, child welfare and juvenile justice in New York, and other children and family issues in New York and around the country."

Email from a CV alumnus to Mike Garcia, CV's Vice President for Residential Services:

I hope this email finds you in good health and spirits. I'm not quite sure when we spoke last so I will fill you in on the last few years.

After wrapping up my BA at the U. of Colorado in 2007, I returned to the Marine Corps as an Infantry Officer. My daughter Lidia was born in 2008 and I deployed to Iraq as a Platoon Commander with the 1st Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion (1st LAR) shortly after her birth. I applied to become a Judge Advocate in 2010. I was selected and started law school at Vermont Law School in August 2010. I will graduate in May 2013.

My family and I are enjoying life in Vermont; we are enjoying the peace and quiet. I will be working this summer in a JAG office, but I will return to Vermont for law school in the fall.

If I could share one thing with the boys now it's this: I was at the Children's Village during the most tumultuous time in my life. I think I was there right as I reached the proverbial fork in the road. The Children's Village was

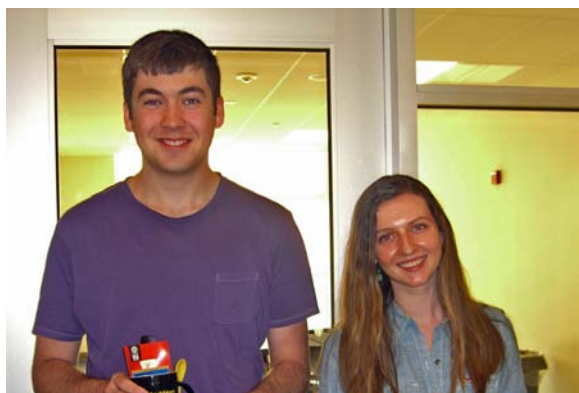

I knew the block. At CV I learned about animals with the Boy Scouts, I played the steel drums, I tap danced, I wrote at the newspaper and, perhaps most importantly, I saw a more rural life. I wanted to find that rural, peaceful life. Living at CV wasn't always easy, but in retrospect I know it was a catalyst, propelling me toward the future."

Commencement Speaker NYC Schools Chancellor Dennis Walcott Praises the Determined Class of 2011

On June 10, fifteen very special students attended a high school graduation ceremony in an outdoor tent on the campus of The Children's Village. For these students, graduation was a very difficult

journey and an incredible achievement. Their teachers, principal, and superintendent all characterized this class as "determined". Many of them came to CV two years or more behind in school, some entering the 10th grade at age 18, but, with the help of their teachers, they were determined to graduate.

The commencement speaker was the newly-appointed NYC Chancellor Dennis Walcott. He encouraged the graduates to try things—not to be afraid to fail. Walcott shared his personal experiences in trying new things such as skydiving to celebrate his 50th birthday, ballroom dancing, and his goal to run a marathon for his 60th birthday. Chancellor Walcott concluded

his remarks by encouraging the graduates to "make a commitment to enjoy life, to confront it and to make the world a better place." Walcott was encouraged by what these students have been able to achieve as he faces the challenge of the New York city schools, which have a low graduation rate for students with backgrounds similar to those at the Children's Village. So far, CV's graduation rate for this year's senior class is 60% but, as students continue to take tests over the summer, we are hopeful it will be 100%.

In his speech to the graduates, Valedictorian Jeffrey Knight said, "The road I was taking was a dead end. I made changes that got me to where I am today—a graduate!" He will be attending college in the fall along with six of his fellow graduates.
