

Everyone Needs to Belong to Someone

Finding youth a place to belong is the sentiment behind The Children's Village Families for Teens program, which received The Council on Accreditation's 2011 Innovative Practices Award. Over the past seven years this program has helped more than 50 older teens, all of whom had given up on being part of a family. Below are some of their stories.

A Typical College Student

In many ways, Lloyd J. is a typical college student. In his senior year at SUNY Cobleskill, he works part-time, plays tennis, thinks a lot about what he will do after graduation, and spends school breaks with family.

But Lloyd is far from typical. He spent most of his life in foster care prior to coming to CV's residential school. With a lot of support, he made

great strides emotionally and academically and was accepted into a fouryear college. However, he was facing the prospect of doing it alone since he had given up on becoming part of a family many years ago.

To his surprise and delight, Lloyd was asked by CV staff member Tommy King and his wife if he would be willing to become their foster son. Lloyd moved in with the King's the summer before his freshman year.

"They made it clear from the beginning that I was part of the whole family. I now have siblings, grandparents, cousins—a whole family. The King's home is now my home."

When I Call Her "Mom" It's Official



"It's unexplainable. I'm just really, really happy now," is how Claude describes feeling about his adoption being finalized in mid September.

Claude, who turned 21 this September, came into foster care when he was five years old. He was placed with Tracey

Roy but, unfortunately, Ms. Roy's apartment was not big enough for her to take his four siblings, so they were split up. Ms. Roy was determined to keep the family together, so she began to pursue adoption for all five children.

"Something always got in the way, but we never gave up," said Roy. After more than a decade and a half, Claude has finally seen his dream come true. "There was a period of time when I didn't know if it would ever happen," says Claude. "But she was always there taking care of me. Now when I call her 'Mom' it's official!"

With the support of his family, Claude is now attending college full-time and looking for a part-time job.

Outcome Corner - The WAY Home

A report published recently by The Center for an Urban Future entitled "Fostering Careers" concluded that "An alarming number of foster youth essentially go from being minor wards of the state to adult wards of the state." CV's WAY Home program helps foster care youth leaving CV's residential school beat those odds by providing a paid professional mentor to help them complete school, get and keep a job, and remain in a stable home. Below are outcomes on WAY Home participants compared to those published in the report on former foster care youth. Recognizing how special this relationship is, staff searched for a family who lived close to his grandfather in Long Island and who would help them maintain a connection. Within a year, the perfect pair was found. Wendell Miller and Milton Scheldorn hit it off with Nicholas right away. They have a mutual love of art and enjoy being together. It was not long before Nicholas and his two dads knew that they had become a very special family.

Shortly after Nicholas' first visit to their home, Wendell and Milton told the staff, "Thank you for making our dream a reality." Now the family is just waiting to finalize the adoption and make their dream permanent.

A Long-Term Parent



Stacy Dessaline did not plan to adopt Donte. "I thought I'd just be a short-term foster parent, but I was so impressed when I first met him, and he kept on impressing me so much that I knew I had to."


Donte lived at The

Children's Village for five years and really struggled in school and had difficulty relating to people. Staff worked hard to help him open up. His volunteer mentor helped a great deal too. Then he met Stacy Dessaline.

"At first it was difficult. He had a hard time talking to me about things and even addressing me. After a few months though, things began to get better. He even called me 'Mom', and that's when I knew we would be ok."

Donte has now lived with his new family for a year and is doing well. Ms. Dessaline keeps him focused through afterschool activities, church, and music lessons. Just like all families, Ms. Dessaline and Donte are still figuring some things out, but they are on the right track. "Things aren't perfect, but they get better every day. I know that we are both blessed."


High School Graduate or Enrolled in School





A New Volunteer Committee Makes the Difference

Donations of in-kind gifts (toys, household goods, furniture, appliances) can make a real difference to a family who has little and to the children in CV's programs. But organizing and distributing them is time consuming. With funding cuts this year, we were planning to stop accepting most donations, but our Community Advisory Group said "No way!" They recruited a volunteer in-kind group that now has six members who come regularly to inventory donations and distribute them to families, cottages, and community programs.

"While this group will be a huge asset all year round," said Candy Fitts, Director of Volunteers, "I can't begin to think what we would do without them for the holidays when so many generous people and organizations donate gifts for the children."
